Legalisation
All foreign civil status documents must be legalised before being submitted to the Swiss representation. The apostille ($\Sigma \phi \rho \alpha \gamma \delta \alpha \tau \eta \zeta \ X \dot{\alpha} \gamma \eta \zeta$) is affixed only by the Ministry of Justice and Public Order.
