

LEAFLET FOR NEWLY REGISTERED SWISS CITIZENS IN IRELAND

1. The Regional Consular Centre should be notified without delay of the following:

- Any change of address or telephone number
- Departure from the consular district
- Any change in civil status (marriage, birth, divorce, death etc.)
- Acquisition or loss of any other nationalities

Failure to provide this information could cause inconvenience.

2. The following opportunities are available to Swiss nationals resident abroad

- Membership of the Solidarity Fund of the Swiss Abroad
- The right to vote in Swiss federal ballots
- Membership of the various Swiss Societies
- Application for Swiss passport/ID card

3. Publication for Swiss nationals resident abroad (Swiss Review)

A magazine, containing information useful to Swiss living abroad and published jointly by the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad and the Swiss Federal Department of Foreign Affairs, is sent periodically to nationals registered with the Regional Consular Centre who live in this consular district for at least a year. <u>Please note that changes of address for the Swiss Review must be sent to the Regional Consular Centre and not to the distributor in Switzerland.</u>

DRIVING LICENCE

If you are a holder of a licence issued in Switzerland you can drive in Ireland when visiting, providing your licence is valid. If you become normally resident in Ireland, you can drive for up to 12 months from the date of becoming resident, as long as your licence has not expired. You are considered to be normally resident in Ireland if, because of personal and occupational ties, you usually live here for at least 185 days in each calendar year.

If you wish to exchange your driving licence for an equivalent Irish driving licence, you must do so within one year of your driving licence expiring.

WORK/RESIDENCE PERMIT FOR IRELAND

As a Swiss national, you have the right to stay in Ireland, and your family members have the right to stay here also. You can stay in Ireland for up to 3 months without restriction. If you plan to stay more than 3 months, you must either:

- · Be engaged in economic activity (employed or self employed) or
- Have sufficient resources and sickness insurance to ensure that you do not become a burden on the social services of Ireland or
- Be enrolled as a student or vocational trainee or
- Be a family member of a Union citizen in one of the previous categories.

When you come to Ireland you do not need to register with the local immigration officer and you do not need a residence card to live here.

WORKING IN IRELAND

SOCIAL INSURANCE

If you are an employee, your social insurance contributions are deducted by your employer and collected by the Revenue Commissioners. In fact, the law makes your employer responsible for Pay Related Social Insurance, though you may have to pay an 'employee's share'.

If you are self-employed, you pay Class S social insurance contributions directly to the Revenue Commissioners. The Revenue Commissioners then pay the money into the Social Insurance Fund. Revenue send a record of the contributions you have paid to the Department of Social Protection.

In order to check your social insurance record, you will need your Personal Public Service Number (PPSN). This number is a unique identification number which you need when dealing with state agencies.

Your PPSN is a unique reference number that helps you access social welfare benefits, public services and information in Ireland. State agencies that use PPS Numbers to identify individuals include the <u>Department</u> of <u>Social Protection</u>, the <u>Revenue Commissioners</u> and the <u>Health Service Executive (HSE)</u>.

You cannot apply for a PPS Number before you arrive in Ireland. You must be living in Ireland to apply for a PPS Number. You will be asked to produce documentary evidence of identity and residence in Ireland. Only the Department of Social Protection can provide you with a PPS Number.
