## **Swiss Representation at the Oscars**

Though Switzerland's entry for Best International Feature missed out on a nomination this year, there is still plenty of Swiss representation to be found at the 2025 Academy

Awards. The film, <u>Conclave</u>, a political thriller about the secret election of a new pope which received eight nominations including 'Best Picture,' is directed by the Swiss-Austrian dual national, Edward Berger. In addition, Tim Fehlbaum, a Basel native, is nominated in the 'Best Screenplay' category for his film <u>September 5</u>, which tells the story of the massacre at the 1972 Munich Olympics. The 97th edition of the Oscars will take place March 2, 2025, and you can follow the ceremony live. Let us know what you think about the movies and keep your fingers crossed for us!

## <u>Emna de la lingua rumantscha</u>

#### February 17-21

Each year at the end of February, Switzerland proudly celebrates its linguistic diversity with the *Emna de la lingua rumantscha* – the week of the Romansh Language. In 1938, the Swiss electorate officially recognized Romansh as Switzerland's fourth national language, alongside German, French and Italian. The protection of linguistic minorities is enshrined in the Swiss Federal Constitution, so although it is only spoken by 0.5% of the population, Romansh remains a vital part of Switzerland's linguistic mix and cultural diversity. A key role in maintaining the language is carried out by the Swiss National Broadcaster and its Romansh-language channel, *RTR* (*Radiotelevisiun Svizra Rumantscha*). ## Screening: Closer to God

If you're interested in documentaries, head to the National Museum of Asian Art for a screening of the Swiss production, *Closer to God*. Filmed in Pakistan, and co-directed and written by Swiss filmmaker, Annette Berger, this 2018 film immerses itself in the spiritual lives of the mystic Gogha Sain, who devotes himself to serving his fellow human beings, and the master singer Ustad Saami, who focuses on carrying this ancient musical heritage of the subcontinent forward to the next generation. What they have in common is the realization that finding themselves is the best way to serve humanity. Registration is free.
