As we look ahead, I remain grateful for your continued interest in Switzerland's work and engagement across the United States. Together with my team, I look forward to new opportunities to strengthen the friendship, cooperation, and mutual understanding that have long defined the Swiss–U.S. relationship.

Ambassador Heckner Attends Groundbreaking of Genentech Manufacturing Facility in North Carolina

On August 25, **Ambassador Heckner** joined Genentech executives, along with federal, state, and local officials, to celebrate the groundbreaking of Genentech's new 700,000-square-foot manufacturing facility in Holly Springs, NC.

The Ambassador was accompanied by Ashley Magargee, CEO of Genentech, Susanne Hundsbaek-Pedersen, Global Head of Pharma Technical Operations at Roche, U.S. Representative Deborah Ross, North Carolina Governor Josh Stein, State Secretary of Commerce Lee Lilley, State Senators Sydney Batch and Lisa Grafstein, State Representative Erin Paré, Wake County Commissioner Cheryl Stallings, and Holly Springs Mayor Sean Mayefskie.

The new facility will play a vital role in advancing the regional economy and ensuring a secure supply of medications for metabolic diseases to patients across the United States. Genentech, a subsidiary of the Swiss pharmaceutical company Roche, is a leader in the biotech industry. With this new site, the company is investing over \$700 million in North Carolina, underscoring its long-term commitment to innovation and workforce development in the state. This project alone will support more than 1,500 construction jobs, and upon completion, will add more than 400 high-wage permanent positions to the already existing 675,000+ jobs supported by Swiss companies in the United States.

This will be Genentech's first manufacturing plant on the East Coast, joining a network of 13 manufacturing and 15 R&D facilities operated by Roche and Genentech nationwide. Together, these sites employ more than 25,000 workers, reinforcing the Swiss pharmaceutical group's leadership in biotechnology and its commitment to ensuring reliable and affordable access to world-class medicine for patients in the United States.

Ambassador Heckner welcomed the project as a symbol of the strong economic partnership between Switzerland and the United States and looks forward to the positive economic and social impact this project will bring to the region.

Swiss Women Leaders Explore Innovation and Collaboration in the United States

From October 5 to 10, a delegation of Swiss women leaders, led by **Maja Riniker**, President of the Swiss National Council, visited the United States, with stops in Houston and Washington, DC. The delegation included several members of parliament, as well as prominent leaders from the business community, academia, and the Swiss administration.

The visit aimed to deepen the delegation's understanding of American innovation and explore opportunities for Swiss-U.S. collaboration. The program featured meetings with leading technology companies in the space and AI industry, Swiss companies, as well as discussions with representatives from the U.S. administration, Congress, academia, and think tanks.

Throughout the trip, the participants gained insights into the vast potential for cooperation on a wide range of areas such as emerging technologies, building on the shared strength of both countries when it comes to top-notch innovation, world-class research institutions, and entrepreneurial spirit.

The delegation developed and strengthened ties with women leaders in Houston and Washington, DC on innovation and trade, nurturing a network for powerful advocates for Switzerland. They identified promising avenues for cooperation in emerging technologies, innovation ecosystems, and workforce development, building on Switzerland's strengths in applied research and the U.S.'s entrepreneurial spirit. The delegation also discussed ways to address the shortage of skilled labor in key U.S. industries, highlighting the potential of the Swiss apprenticeship model as a source of inspiration.

Overall, the mission was a resounding success, fostering new connections and paving the way for stronger future partnerships between Switzerland and the United States.

Civilian Hackers in Armed Conflicts and International Law

On September 15, the Embassy of Switzerland in Washington, DC, in partnership with the Tech, Law & Security Program at American University Washington College of Law, hosted a panel discussion on "Civilian Hackers in State Conflicts – Status and Rules of Engagement under International Law."

The event brought together experts in international law, cybersecurity, diplomacy, and the private sector to examine the growing involvement of civilians in cyber operations during armed conflicts—a development that poses new challenges for the application of International Humanitarian Law (IHL).

In his opening remarks, **Deputy Head of Mission Adrian Hauri** emphasized Switzerland's commitment to protecting civilians in armed conflict, including through the application of IHL in cyberspace. He also highlighted the role of International Geneva as a global hub for digital governance and multilateral cooperation.

Moderated by **Danielle Yeow** (National University of Singapore), the panel featured **Tilman Rodenhäuser** (ICRC), **Giacomo Biggio** (University of Bristol), **Fanta Orr** (Microsoft), and **Gary Corn** (American University). The discussion focused on the ICRC's "Eight rules for 'civilian hackers' during war, and four obligations for states to restrain them," along with broader issues such as accountability, state responsibility, and the role of tech companies. The evening concluded with a reception and continued discussion among participants.

Switzerland and Colorado join Forces through the National Guard's State Partnership Program

On September 15, the Swiss Armed Forces and the Colorado National Guard took a concerted step towards cooperation by signing a Letter of Intent to be paired under the U.S. National Guard's State Partnership Program.

Switzerland and Colorado share much more than their mountainous landscapes—they are connected by cultural, economic, and technological ties, as well as a shared commitment to service through their militia systems. Both the Swiss Armed Forces and Colorado National Guard are composed of citizen soldiers, reflecting similar values of civic responsibility and resilience.

The new partnership opens possibilities for joint activities such as training and the sharing of expertise in mountain operations, cyber defense, CBRN defense, and mine clearance. Further cooperation may also include air defense, the use of each other's training infrastructure, and force development under the militia system.

Beyond military cooperation, the agreement opens avenues for civilian collaboration in science, technology, and education, helping to further strengthen Swiss–U.S. relations. Importantly, the partnership fully aligns with Swiss neutrality, as participation remains voluntary and carries no binding obligations or dependencies.

The letter of Intent, signed in Bern by Lieutenant General Thomas Süssli, Chief of the Swiss Armed Forces, and Major General Laura L. Clellan, Adjutant General of Colorado, marks the first of two steps in this budding partnership. A Memorandum of Understanding is expected to be formally signed in Colorado next year, paving the way for long-term cooperation and exchange.

Congressional Briefing on Apprenticeships with Swiss Companies

On September 10, the Embassy of Switzerland and the House Career and Technical Education Caucus co-hosted a congressional briefing on "Modern American Careers that are Fit for Apprenticeships." The event was co-chaired by **Representatives G.T. Thompson** (R-PA) and **Suzanne Bonamici** (D-OR).

In his opening remarks, **Ambassador Heckner** highlighted the 175th anniversary of the U.S.–Swiss Friendship Treaty and Switzerland's strong apprenticeship model.

Human resources representatives from **Bühler Aeroglide**, **Zurich Insurance**, **Kudelski**, and **Aon** shared insights into how apprenticeships benefit their organizations by addressing skills gaps and strengthening employee development. Former apprentices from these companies reflected on their own journeys, emphasizing the value of combining practical work experience with formal education.

The session concluded with concrete guidance for companies interested in developing apprenticeship programs, starting with assessing workforce needs and building partnerships with local educational institutions.

Progressive Rollout of the new Entry/Exit System (EES) starting October 12, 2025

The Entry/Exit System (EES), Europe's new border management system for registering non-EU nationals travelling for short stays, started operations on October 12, 2025. European countries using the EES, which include Switzerland, will introduce the system gradually at their external borders. This means that data collection will be gradually introduced at border crossing points with full implementation by April 10, 2026.
